NOBLE NOTATION

NOTHIN' COULD BE FINER

.....than dinner in the Diner. The original author of this little ditty is hiding in the pages of history but the words remain delightfully true. In fact, for many travelers, recollections of a meal in a railway dining car are the standout memories of a trip on a train. I still remember breakfast with my Mom aboard Canadian Pacific's "The Dominion". I can still picture my pancakes arriving at our table under the elegant silver dome.

The dining car was a bit of a latecomer to the passenger train consist. In earlier times, passengers had to fend for themselves — you brought your own food or you didn't eat. By the mid 19th century, the railroads let passengers off the train when the engine needed water. This produced the spectacle of passengers storming onto the platform in search of a local hash house or beanery. A (usually dreadful) meal of stale bread, rancid bacon and cold beans would be choked down as the impatient engine crew blew the whistle to announce the tender was full of water and the train was about to depart. A meal made memorable for all the wrong reasons.

In the decades following the American Civil War, railways in Canada and the US grew rapidly, expanding ever westward. The expanding rail network and resulting longer trips made the need for on board food services more apparent. In 1868, the American George Pullman, already the largest builder and operator of sleeping cars, built and introduced his "hotel car" - the "Delmonico" - the first true dining car. This small beginning grew to over 1700 train routes with dining cars at the peak of the service in the 1920s and 30s.



Let's take a moment to discuss the various kinds (levels?) of food service that existed on passenger trains. The railway provided cool water in each car, from water coolers. I'll bet a lot of you remember as a kid going to the cooler, pulling a squishy "Dixie" paper cup from the dispenser and pushing the button on the tap. Man, that was good water. Now, everything from here on was "pay as you go". Apart from water, no food or beverage service was included with your ticket. The most basic service was the News Agent or "newsy" who sold his wares up and down the aisles of the day coaches. He was often a teenager who was provided with a uniform cap and minimum wage by the railway and had a basket of sandwiches, fruit, chocolate bars, gum and pop with a few magazines and newspapers and rode back and forth between stations.

The next step was the Buffet car where passengers could buy simple food such as sandwiches, fruit, coffee or pop to carry back to their coach seat or sleeper space.

The Dinette car was the next level up. This car, which boasted a small number of tables and a lunch counter with stools, provided sit-down service at moderate prices. The Dinette was presided over by a steward/short order cook who could produce a wide range of freshly prepared soups, bacon and eggs, chops and dishes like spaghetti. Ice cream, pie and puddings were popular desserts. This service was popular with coach and sleeping car


passengers because it provided wholesome fare that didn't "break the bank". We have a fine example of a restored Dinette car on the Wheatland Express. Our GSR 2017 looks pretty much as it did in 1949 when it was built for service on the Union Pacific Railroad.

At the top of the culinary heap came the full Dining Car or Diner. By the turn of the 20th century, the dining car was pretty much standardized. As shown below, about two thirds of an 80 foot car was devoted to the dining room - six 4-passenger tables on one side of the aisle and six 2-passenger tables on the other side for a capacity of 36 diners. By the late 1940s all 4-passenger tables increased the capacity to 48 guests on some cars. The rest of the car contained a pantry. the kitchen or galley and a passageway for entrance to the car. The car was staffed with a chef and one or two cooks, a Steward and up waiters. to four The kitchen refrigerators, a broiler and range and a steam table fed by steam from the locomotive. The pantry had dish warmers, sinks, bunkers for ice and ice cream and the serving buffet.

Pretty much everything was cooked or baked from scratch and the meals were legendary. Railroads aimed their diner service at the top end of the restaurant scale and, even though they charged top end prices, diners mostly operated at a loss. Railroads accepted this "loss leader" as a cost of advertising their routes and service. In fact, many travelers chose their route based on the

reputation and choice of fare on the dining car. Roads and their chefs competed to create dishes, often, regional delicacies from the areas they served. Railways had signature specialties - Chicken Potpie on the Wabash, Lobster Newburg on New York Central's "Twentieth Century Limited" and Winnipeg Goldeye (picked up fresh every trip in Winnipeg) on Canadian Pacific. A glance through Dining Car menus from "The Age of The Diner" reveals tempting selections and choices rivaling the finest restaurants. With everything cooked to order in the onboard galley. Just another day on a dining car.

While the heyday of Diner service has become history, gone away with regular passenger trains, there are still some delightful dining car experiences to be found. In Canada, we are well served by VIA. In Eastern Canada, VIA's intercity trains serve delicious meals to Club Car passengers their seats and on board transcontinental Canadian, a full dining car still provides outstanding meals with elegant service. However, you don't need to go that far to enjoy the pleasure and charm of a great meal as we roll through the countryside. Come ride with us on the Wheatland Express. Sample one Culinary Excursions. 
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Weatland Express Excursion Train
